## The Problem of Suffering

#### THEODICY VS. DEFENSE

### Step 1: Either God cannot exist if suffering exists and/or it is very unlikely God exists if God exists.

- 1. Answering this problem may not necessarily cure our curiosity. We may never know until heaven why PARTICULAR suffering occur. But, we can still overcome the objection that God cannot/probably does not exist based on suffering.
- 2. There are 3 versions of the problem of suffering: logical version, probable version, and the emotional version.
- 3. Logical version: it is impossible for an all good, powerful, and knowing God to exist if suffering exists
  - a. It's impossible because if God is all good a world without suffering is always preferable, if God is all powerful, he is able to create a world without suffering, and if God is all knowing, he is aware of it and foresees it.
  - b. Response (incorrect response): God is either not all good, knowing, and/or powerful
  - Response (correct response): God is all good, powerful, loving BUT...

God DOES foresee suffering

God does NOT always prefer a world without suffering: some MIGHT be justifiable (e.g. character building, natural consequences, afterlife rewards, etc.)

God CANNOT create any world he desires: worlds with free creatures MIGHT always contain suffering

- 4. Probable version: it is not impossible, but it appears unlikely, that an all good, powerful, and knowing God exists if evil exists
  - a. It's unlikely given the amount and kinds of suffering that God exists
  - RESPONSES
    - i. Even if it is likely, it is only likely if all other arguments for God fail
    - ii. Evil might be necessary for some purpose, e.g. FREEDOM (God must allow it for SOME reason)
    - iii. How could we possibly know evil is completely unnecessary?
- Emotional version: God's existence is undesirable if evil (esp. certain kinds of evil) exists.
  - RESPONSE: counseling, Biblical meditation, all the steps to dealing with emotional/volitional doubt (Gary Habermas, Dealing with Doubt)
- 6. Sources of suffering: human free will and natural evil (earthquakes, tidal waves, tornadoes, etc.)


# The Dot Puzzle: what appears impossible is possible

#### Step #2: Suffering exists

Sometimes a person (either a Christian or non-Christian) gets to this step and denies the existence of suffering.

- Without suffering we have no need for God.
- Without suffering (as evil) there is no need for the cross since there is no sin.
- Without suffering (for the atheist) the problem of evil disappears!
